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THE BIRTH OF RTE

The need of education in India was recognised way before the beginning of the freedom struggle by reformers such as Raja Ram Mohan Roy, Ishwar Chand Vidyasagar, and Jugul Kishore Sukul etc. Education played an important role in creating awareness among people. Also, it ignited young minds to do something for the nation. Indians with vast diversity in society and social structure were good in indigenous education, but the social structure was brimming with draw backs. There was inequality among the society and a huge gap between the education level of rich and poor. To eradicate this inequality, the Indian Constitution provided reservations. But, It wasn't enough, we still had a long way to go in this direction. Moreover, the educational reforms all over the world convinced the Indian political and social sectors that education should be made a basic right of humans. As a result, the Indian Government introduced a bill, 'The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act' or 'Right to Education Act', which was passed by the Parliament on 4 August 2009. However, the act came into force only on 1 April 2010.

GUARANTEES OF RTE

As per the Constitution of India, the Right to Education Act guarantees free and compulsory education to all children of the age of 6 to 14 years. Besides this, the Act also guarantees the following things:

- The schools will get a subsidy from the government for giving free education (65% of the subsidy will come from the Centre and 35% from states). The government subsidy will be based on the expenditure per student in government schools or Kendriya Vidyalayas, while many private schools spend much more.
- Not enrolled/dropout children be admitted to age appropriate class. Special training will be given to such children so that they are at par with others .A child so admitted is entitled to completion of education even after the age of 14. The act also softens barriers like birth certificate, transfer certificate, etc.
- The Act also provides that no child shall be held back, expelled or required to pass a board examination until the completion of elementary education.
- The Act bars corporal punishment and mental harassment .
- The Act provides for a special organization, The National Commission for the Protection of Child Rights, an autonomous body set up in 2007, to monitor the implementation of the act, together with Commissions to be set up by the states.

AND SOME OF US ARE STILL NOT IN SCHOOL!

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- In India, as on 30-Sep-2000, approximately 35 million children still need to be enrolled.
- Those outside the school system are mostly SC/ST girls, working children, children of poor families, disabled children and children in difficult circumstances.
- Many children are not attending school because of poverty, sibling care responsibility, household chores, work in the fields and factories, wage labour, work in family occupations, etc.
- A large number of children drop out of school because of school-related reasons like attitude of teachers, irrelevant curriculum, substandard teaching, teacher absenteeism, uninteresting teaching, corporal punishment, poor school infrastructure, inability to cope with the pace of learning, lack of parental support in the case of first generation learners, maladjustment in school, etc.
